The "run" on the German Savings Bank, which lasted for several days, is happily ended without disturbing any of the great business interests of our city. and I feel prompted to express my lasting gratitude to the legion of friends who tendered me, in case of need, the use of currency in various sums, from \$5,000 to \$150,000, in order to sustain the bank. The great resources held at my command by Messrs, Greenebaum Bros. & Co. made it entirely unnecessary to accept any of the generous offers of my many friends here. I am much gratified in stating that the "run" was almost wholly confined to that portion of my German depositors who came to Chicago during the last year, operatives and laborers who lodged their small carnings in the German Savings Bank to the extent of 300 new accounts per month, without knowing anything either about myself or Chicago generally, and are therefore not to blame for having credited false and unfounded rumors about the solvency of the bank.
